

Reading Readiness

Early literacy -what children know about reading and writing before they actually learn to read and write.

Emergent literacy -the concepts, skills, and positive attitudes that form the foundation for subsequent reading and writing achievement

School readiness -a combination of the different skills that lead to school success: positive early literacy experiences, physical and mental health, social skills, playing well with others, basic cognitive skills, curiosity and enthusiasm about learning

Working with very young children

Do NOT expect:

- the children to sit still
- the children to appear to be listening to you the whole time
- all of the children to smile or look like they're having fun
- to keep the group's attention for more than 15-20 minutes
- things to go as you planned

DO expect:

- children to leave the area, approach you, run around, lie on the ground
- that someone will cry. It probably won't be you.
- that when you ask a question (or even when you don't), children will call out answers.
 Alternately, the whole group will be struck silent.

Read 2-4 Thematic Stories



Choose stories that are:

- *brief—no more than 5 minutes!
- *visually irresistible—illustrations speak to all ages
- *repetitive text allows audience involvement + greater retention




Sing some songs!

Why?


- Puppets get attention!

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Make a Bug Catcher!

This craft is a great way to reuse a juice bottle while safely learning about the insects in our world. After your observations, be sure to return the critters where you found them!



- · Empty plastic juice bottle with at least one flat side and lid
- Scissors
- Craft foam
- Hot glue gun
- · Scrap piece of window screen or tulle
- Natural items like rocks, grass, twigs etc.

How to make it:

- Remove all labels from juice bottle. Wash inside and out thoroughly with warm water and mild dish soap. Rinse well and dry. Be sure to save the lid.
- 2. Lay bottle on its flat side and use scissors to cut on opening on the side facing up.
- Place rocks, pebbles, dirt, grass, twigs, or whatever other natural items you choose inside the bottle through the opening.
- Cut a piece of screen or tulle to fit over the opening, overlapping it by about %" all the way around the edge.
- Cut a piece of craft foam about %" bigger (all the way around) than the screen or tulle you just cut out. Cut center out of foam to create a "window."
- 6. Hot glue the screen to the craft foam.
- 7. Hot glue the screen window to the opening on the bottle.
- To catch bugs with your bottle, place the bottle on the ground in tall grass where insects can climb
 in. Alternatively, you can catch insects on your own and place them into the bottle through the lid
 opening, then secure the lid.
- If you have trouble setting an insect free, or if you need to replace to greenery inside, you can easily
 peel back the screen cover. To replace, simply add more hot glue, and secure in place again.

*Remember! Do not leave the bottle in the sun, especially with insectionside. The plastic can get very hot and cause harm to your houseguests.

Collecting Bugs Safely

When looking for bugs, you may find some that are unsafe, such as bees, wasps, centipedes, and certain spiders. Do not swat at, touch, or harass these creatures. All of them to have a clear escape route away from

you. Most will not bother you if you o not bother them! Make sure to roll logs toward you and life rocks so the section peneath them opens away from you.


Snack Idea: Bugs on a Log: Spread cream cheese, nut butter, or another spread on a carrot, celery, or pretzel stick. Put a row of raisin bugs along the top.



At-home Activities

Track Cracker Snacks:

Spread softened cream cheese or hummus onto round crackers. Arrange small strips of carrot or red pepper on each one to resemble a bird track. Use raisins to create a cattrack.



Go on a track hunt!

Look for animal tracks in your neighborhood or park. The best places to find them are near water or in muddy or sandy areas. If you don't find any, try "catching" animal tracks in your yard: spread fine dirt, sand, or cornmeal in a shallow tray, sprinkle some bird seed in the middle, and set the tray out overnight in a place you think animals might live or visit.

Fabulous Footprint Art


It seems you can make almost any animal out of your child's adorable footprint; here are a few favorites:



Footprints aren't the only sign that animals have been here! Look for these other signs near your house, in the park, by the river—wherever you go. The more you look, the more you'll start to see!

- . Cat foot prints on automobiles
- marks left on trees by cats and squirrels
- · Prints left in the sno
- · Snail and slug trails

- · Prints left in sand (e.g., at the playground)
- . Droppings or scat left by birds, rodents, pets, etc.
- · Nut shells discarded by squirrels
- Evidence that leaves have been eaten by insects, snails, slugs, or other animals



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Background

Weather vs. Climate: What's the Difference?

Weather describes what's happening outdoors at any given time, and can change quickly. If it's rainy, sunny, snowing, or windy today—that's weather. Climate is the total of all weather over a period of years in a certain place. Climate tells us what it's usually like in that place.



Climate Change

The overwhelming majority of scientists agree that the actions of humans are contributing to a change in global climate. The earth's average temperature has risen by 1.4 degrees Flover the past 100 years—that may not seem like much, but it's already been enough to cause changes in rainfall patterns, storm frequency and intensity, ocean levels, and range and migration patterns for many animals and plants. Climate change is real, and the choices we make today will shape the world our children and grandchildren live in.

Earth Day-Every Day!

Actions you and your families take every day affect the planet, but there's no need to overwhelm kids with gloom and doom. Teach them to love the Earth, and they will naturally care for it as they get older. Below are a few fun ideas for being Earth-friendly year-round!

Grow a Garden



You don't have to have a green thumb or acres of land to grow something! Try a few containers or a bed of peas, beans, radiohes, or carrots—an added benefit is that children are often far more willing to eat vegetables they have grown themselves. Let your child choose flowers or other plants that appeal to him or her at the nursery, then work together to prepare the soil, transplant the seedling, give it a drink, and watch it grow!

Get Craftu!

A quick Google or Pinterest search will reveal more re-use and recycle projects than you could possibly tackle before your little one heads to college. Tried and true—and perfect for this time of year: turn a milk or juice carton into a birdfeeder, or melt those old broken crayons down into new ones!



Take a Hike

The Sacramento region is filled with wonderful nature reserves to explore, but your neighborhood park works perfectly well with little ones, too! Try going on a scavenger hunt for colors or shapes—but be willing to follow whatever catches your child's interest. At this age, it's not about how much distance you cover or how many plants or animals you can identify; it's simply about being outside together—and having fun!


