



Ice Breakers Getting to know you

- ❖ Nature names good for outdoor school or camp groups
 Various ways to do nature names activity
- ❖ "Line up like rocks" an example for young school group Helps you to establish group management
- ❖ Hidden Talent good for high school aged students
 Emphasizes confidence building and community



Setting Expectations Building trust

- ❖ Classroom rules good for school groups
 Remind kids they are still in school, what are the rules?
 Quiet signs coyote, banana slug
- Community agreement good for outdoor school/camp groups, and high schoolers

Gives the kids responsibility to the group and to take responsibility for their own behavior

- Follow through refer to community agreement
- ❖ Set your own organization-wide rules Be respectful, be safe, and have fun!



Be Intentional Set yourself up for success

Plan more activities than you could do in the allotted time

Go to materials – whiteboard, bandanas, compass, field guide, binoculars, collecting box/nets

Each activity has a purpose or somehow relates back to a central theme or idea

Affirm and celebrate all aspects of the day

1 thing learned, 1 thing enjoyed

Evaluate what students got out of the program



Reflect On Your Work You're awesome

Remember to write down or acknowledge what worked and didn't work

Colleagues can be a great place to start for feedback and ideas

Celebrate! Reenergize!

Don't forget to pat yourself on the back and remain positive about the work that you do
